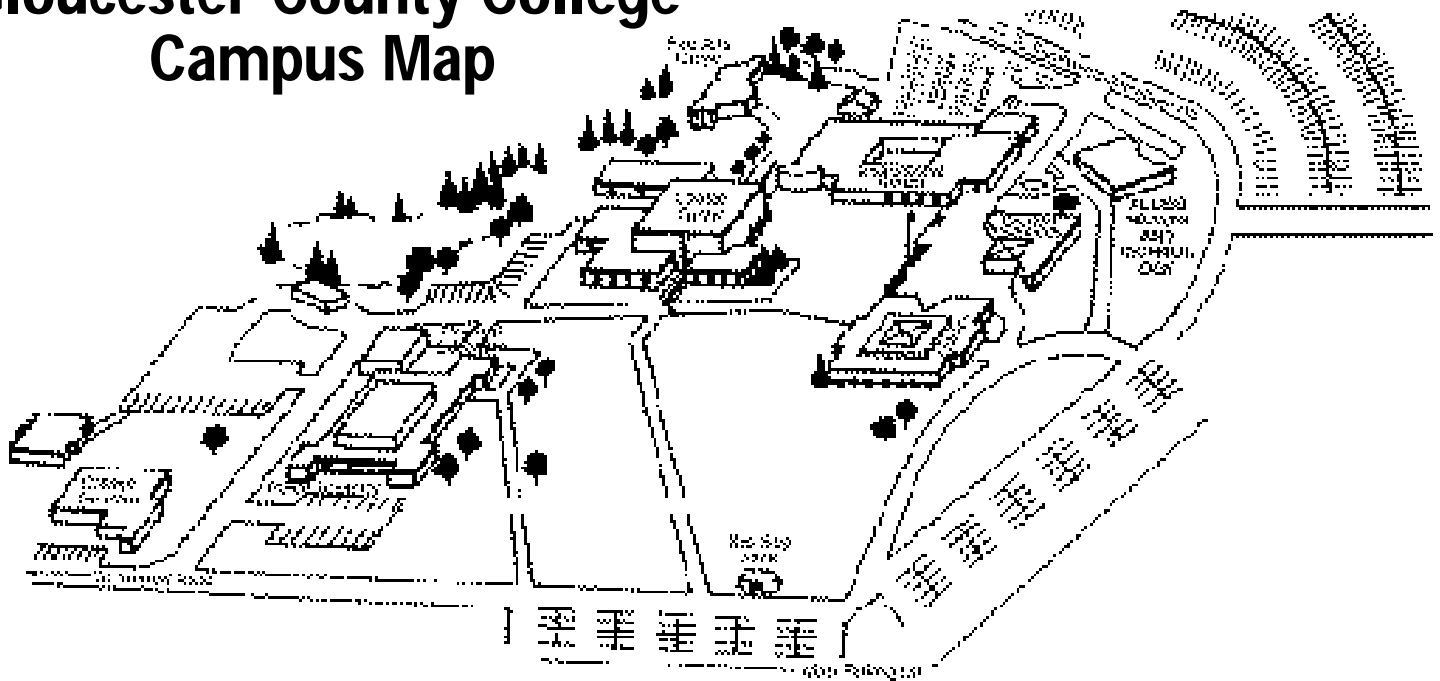


Gloucester County College Campus Map

The Refugee Internet Assistance Initiative at Fort Dix

On Thursday, May 20, 1999, Professor Joan Smith-Brown of Gloucester County College and I spent the afternoon with Dave Zweigel, Chas Hausheer, both of the United States Information Agency and Gail Vonderweidt of Princeton Mac Users Group at Fort Dix, New Jersey with the Kosovar Refugees. Apple, Inc. has donated 12 iMacs (6 Grape and 6 Tangerine) and one Blue and White Server, to a project called the Refugee Internet Assistance Initiative.

The main purposes of this project is to get news and information in Albanian, be it streaming media, such as Voice of America, the BBC or other televisions stations or print media, to the refugees. Another very important purpose of this project is to help these people find their family members or friends, and to register with the Red Cross, one way directional family searcher. The Red Cross will deliver messages but then it is up to the recipient to respond. There is a great degree of privacy here, so only those who want to be found will be able to be found. The refugees are also very interested in finding information on where they will be heading to settle down when they leave Fort Dix or as with the younger generation, they want to know about colleges and universities. A fun side to this has been the young men,s interest in the latest NBA scores and the fact that they have found "Nanosaur" on the iMac,s. We used Netscape and set up five easily accessed bookmarks for these purposes. The most difficult thing was trying to remember to use the umlauts when typing in Albanian. Of course, the iMac,s all are using OS 8.6, which allows you use "Sherlock" to do any web searching.

The day we visited, there were often times a wait to access a computer, or there were several

people gathered around a computer to see a newscast. There were three young men with bright orange armbands who acted as interrupters. Each and every one of the people we had contact with were bright, friendly, eager to learn and very polite. There was a list of do's and don'ts at the Media Center (where we had to wait for our escort, as the refugees are in a secured location). You can smile and be friendly, you can't swear, you can't touch them with your left hand, only your right hand, you can't touch a member of the opposite sex, no bare midriffs or skimpy clothing, you can't expose the bottom of your shoe and you can't stare.

Sears to sell iMacs

iMacs on sale at Sears stores? Steve Jobs says the silicon side of Sears will debut over Memorial Day weekend in five fruity flavors.

Apple interim CEO Jobs said Sears has signed on as a retail outlet for Apple's most popular Mac, with iMacs expected to go on sale on Memorial Day, May 31, at 800 Sears Roebuck and Co. stores nationwide.

Jobs delivered the good news Monday during his keynote speech at the opening of Apple's annual Worldwide Developers Conference in San Jose, Calif.

Jobs also announced immediate availability of Mac OS 8.6—a free download for OS 8.5 owners that comes with significant enhancements to its nanokernel, the core of the operating system—and unveiled new professional-level G3 PowerBooks. Jobs said the 400-MHz PowerBook G3 will sell for

Apple Introduces Mac OS 8.6

Free Mac OS Update Improves Sherlock Search Feature, System Stability and PowerBook Battery Life

At its annual Worldwide Developer Conference (WWDC), Apple Computer introduced Mac OS 8.6, an update to the Macintosh operating system that provides an easier to use and more powerful Sherlock search feature; increases system stability; and delivers significantly improved battery life for PowerBook users. Mac OS 8.6 is available today as a free update for Mac OS 8.5 customers and can be downloaded from www.apple.com/macOS.

“Mac OS 8.5 has been a hit with Mac customers all over the world and Sherlock has changed the way people access information on the Internet,” said Phil Schiller, Apple’s vice president of worldwide product marketing. “Mac OS 8.6 builds upon this great foundation and is packed with new features that will benefit millions of Macintosh customers, whether they have an iMac, PowerBook or Power Macintosh.”

The primary new features in Mac OS 8.6 include:

- Updated version of Sherlock—the personal search detective introduced in Mac OS 8.5—with over 25 plug-ins that allow fast searches of popular web sites such as CNN Interactive, CNET, Amazon.com, Barnes and Noble, Music Boulevard and Rolling Stone, in addition to Internet search engines such as Alta Vista, Excite, HotBot, Infoseek and Lycos. Sherlock’s “find by content” feature now includes the ability to search the content of PDF and HTML files stored on your hard drive;

- Advanced power management technologies that increase PowerBook battery life by more than one hour on PowerBook computers;

- Improved USB and FireWire® inte-

gration, providing superior plug and play and support for the latest USB and FireWire peripherals;

Corporate Figures on Apple Profitability

Apple had a closed meeting with financial analysts on May 19th. It seems that some were impressed and some weren't. April's average Mac sale was \$1369 up by \$63 from March. At a time when total average sales for PCs was down 19% to \$928. In fact the under \$1000 PC made up 71% of all retail sales. Apple's units sold doubled and was the third largest manufacturer. Didn't get market share, but from those numbers it had to grow. Another interesting item in the reports was that the analysts expect Apple to buy back shares. That should help stock prices rise. Apple Releases QuickTime 4 Public Beta With Internet Streaming

Apple First To Embrace Non-Proprietary Streaming Server Software
Apple Computer released the public beta of QuickTime 4, its industry-leading multimedia software, for both the Macintosh and Windows platforms. QuickTime 4 features “streaming” of live and stored video and audio over the Internet, and is the first Internet streaming solution to use non-proprietary

industry-standard RTP and RTSP protocols for streaming over the Internet. In addition, Apple announced that it has begun licensing its open Internet Streaming Server software under an Open Source model (see separate release). The public beta software also includes an all new QuickTime Player that offers easy access to QuickTime content, and significant enhancements to the QuickTime PictureViewer application and QuickTime Web Browser Plug-in.

\$3,499 and a 333-MHz model for \$2,499. The new PowerBooks are 20 percent thinner and 2 pounds lighter than current models, and extending the laptops’ battery life 90 minutes—now able to run five hours on a single charge.

The PowerBooks will ship with 10/100Base T Ethernet, a 6-Gbyte hard drive, 64 Mbytes of RAM and USB connectors. It will be available May 20, Jobs said.

Also Monday, Jobs announced that Apple’s new 3D technology, OpenGL, is available now for free download from Apple’s Web site, and he said Version 2.1.2 of Apple’s Mac OS Runtime for Java is also available.

Jobs and Apple Vice President for Software Engineering Avie Tevanian wowed the WWDC crowd with a “technology demonstration” of forthcoming Mac support for Sun’s Java 2 format. Their tag-team bake-off showed a 400-MHz G3 running a Java 2 animation four times faster than a 500-MHz Pentium III system.

Phil Schiller, Apple vice president of marketing, came onstage to outline new features of the forthcoming Sherlock 2 search engine and to offer a “sneak peek” at new features in Apple’s next OS revision, code-named Sonata and due to be released in the fall.

Schiller did not say what version number Sonata will carry, but he said it will feature new security features and major enhancements that will allow multiple users to maintain individual preferences on a single computer.

“We are embracing the non-proprietary open server model for Internet streaming, and even giving away great server software under our Open Source licensing model,” said Steve Jobs, Apple’s interim CEO. “From this day forward, content providers, ISPs and network managers will have a choice—they will not be forced to pay a server tax to Real Networks for their proprietary server software.”

QuickTime 4’s new Internet streaming capabilities allow users to play live and stored video and audio using a variety of compressors and decompressors, enabling them to experience high-quality playback even over 28.8Kbps modems.

Macintosh and Windows users can immediately download a free version of QuickTime 4 public beta software from Apple’s QuickTime web site (www.apple.com/quicktime). The advanced playback and editing capabilities of QuickTime 4 Pro are available to users for U.S. \$29.99. QuickTime 3 Pro customers are automatically upgraded to QuickTime 4 Pro free of charge upon downloading the QuickTime 4 public beta software.

System requirements for Mac OS-based systems are: 68020, 68030, 68040 or PowerPC processor; at least 8MB of RAM recommended for 68020, 68030 or 68040 processor-based systems and at least 16MB of RAM recommended for PowerPC processor-based systems; and MAC OS 7.1 or later. PowerPC processor required for streaming. System requirements for Windows-based systems are: Intel or compatible processor or any MPC2-compliant PC with minimum 66-MHz 486 processor; at least 16MB of RAM.
